

## HIGHLIGHTS

In spring 2010, 293 students applied for admission to Montclair State University as new freshmen. Montclair State University accepted 28 percent (82) of these applicants. Seventy-one percent (58) of those accepted enrolled in classes.

### **Full-time, First-time Freshmen**

In spring 2010, the CSAT score was 1,066 for accepted full-time, first-time freshmen, regardless of admission type, and 1072 for those who enrolled. The average class rank was 62 for accepted student and 55 for enrolled students.

Forty-three percent of enrolled full-time, first-time freshmen were female. Of those who disclosed their race/ethnicity information, 50 percent were White, 20 percent were Hispanic, almost 13 percent were Black/African-American and 5 percent were Asian. Almost 3 percent indicated they were two or more races. Additionally, 10 percent were international students.

The average age of first-time, full-time freshmen who enrolled at Montclair State University in spring 2010 was 22 years.

Almost 83 percent of our full-time, first-time freshmen resided in New Jersey. Almost two-thirds of all full-time, first-time enrolled freshmen came from four counties: Passaic (24 percent), Essex (21 percent), and Bergen (7 percent). Seventeen percent were from out of state.

### **First-time Transfers**

In spring 2010, 1,988 first-time, full- and part-time transfer students applied to MSU, an increase of 6 percent from the 1,872 students who applied last spring. Over 48 percent of those applying were accepted. Of the 1,101 who were accepted, over 66 percent (730) enrolled in classes.

Sixty-three percent of enrolled first-time, full- and part-time transfer students were female. Of those who disclosed their race/ethnicity information, 59 percent were White; 22 percent were Hispanic; 7 percent were Black/African-American; and 6 percent were Asian/Pacific Islander. Additionally, almost 4 percent were international students.

Just over 54 percent of newly enrolled transfer students transferred from New Jersey public community colleges. Sixty percent of the New Jersey community college students came from three community colleges in particular: Bergen Community College (36%), County College of Morris (14%) and Essex County College (10%).

In total, 730 new undergraduate students started MSU in spring 2010. New transfer students made up 92 percent of all new students, followed by new freshmen at 8 percent.
